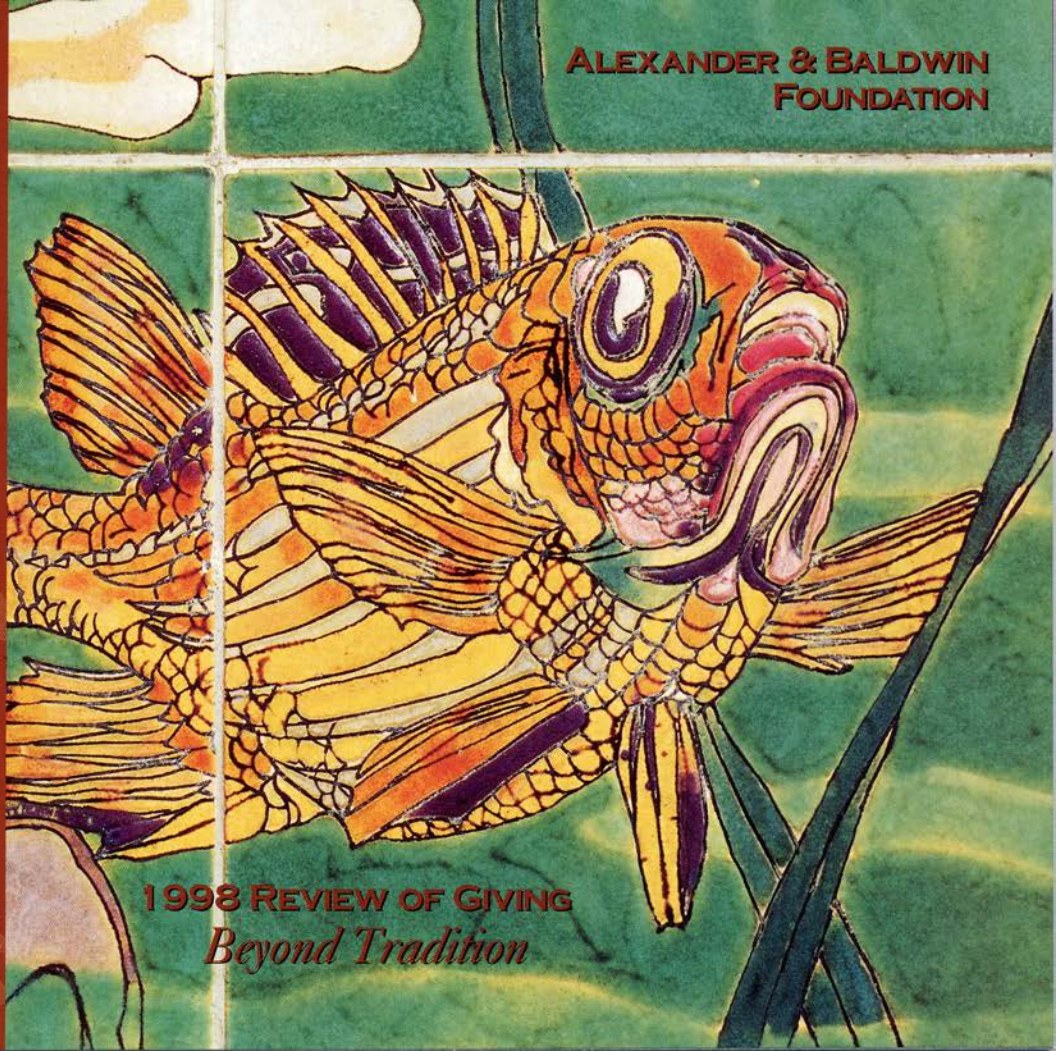

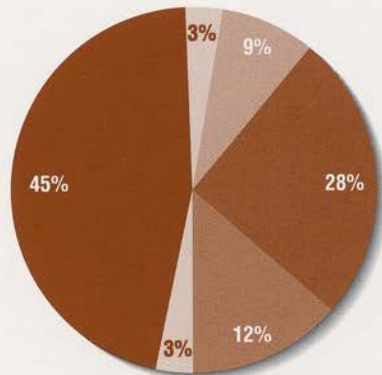

THE YEAR IN REVIEW

DURING 1998, the A&B Foundation continued its tradition of support for areas in which A&B employees live and work. Charities within the State of Hawaii were granted roughly \$1 million; West Coast and other mainland charities garnered close to a quarter of a million dollars.

Oahu-based charities received about \$550,000; many statewide charities are headquartered on Oahu and A&B has roughly 400 employees and its corporate headquarters located in downtown Honolulu. Charities on the island of Maui, where A&B has about 1,000 employees and significant assets, were granted roughly \$340,000. Kauai, which is home to more than 250 A&B employees, received more than \$115,000 for its charitable needs. Worthy causes on the Big Island and Guam, together, were granted \$22,000.

In the Bay Area, where nearly 600 of A&B's employees live and work, more than \$150,000 was granted to local charities. Nearby, in Contra Costa County, home to another 500 employees, close to \$40,000 was granted to local charities. In the Pacific Northwest, Southern California and across the nation, another \$60,000, in total, was received from A&B by a variety of non-profits.

Focus of our support

SIZE OF GRANTS

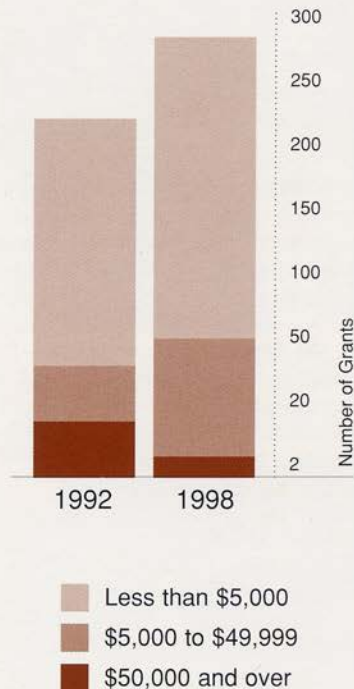
THE FOUNDATION'S resources have remained level in recent years, while community needs have increased. In response, the A&B Foundation has changed its traditional approach to giving and is tending toward more, but smaller, grants to larger numbers of organizations. In 1998, nearly 360 grants were made to 316 different organizations in Hawaii and on the West Coast, and the grants ranged in size from \$100 to \$185,000.

Half of the Foundation's ten largest grants—of \$20,000 and more—represented ongoing support for United Way organizations—clearly a traditional funding choice which we have chosen to continue. More typical in size, however, are the nearly 190 smaller grants which ranged from \$1,000 to \$2,500.

CATEGORIES FUNDED

TOPPING THE LIST, year after year, is the broad category of health & human service agencies, which received nearly \$590,000 in support in 1998. Education—the key to a better quality of life—garnered more than \$260,000. Culture and arts organizations benefited from nearly \$175,000 and a range of community causes warranted just over \$170,000. Special interest areas—maritime and the environment—benefited from another \$80,000.

Within these broad categories, however, the A&B Foundation is stretching to fund programs and agencies that offer new approaches to traditional challenges, as well as fresh efforts in response to new needs.



CONSISTENCY IS A TRADITION

FOR SOME CAUSES, the Alexander & Baldwin Foundation's support is something they can count on, year-after-year. This consistency is important to them, whether our grant is sizeable or meets just a small part of their needs. We believe our reliability demonstrates a long-term commitment to our communities. Here are a few examples:

\$7,500 Hawaii 4-H—Adolescents learn skills and responsibility as they care for animals within the 4-H program; it supports a traditional agricultural lifestyle and possible future careers in farming and animal husbandry. A&B's support for this program goes back decades and varies from bids at annual livestock auctions to program funding.

\$1,500 Charles Armstrong School—This school for dyslexic and special needs students in Belmont, CA, has a loyal benefactor in the A&B Foundation. For more than a decade, its students have benefited from unrestricted annual support, which is used for materials and training in special instructional techniques.

\$1,500 Hugh O'Brien Youth Foundation—A long weekend with fellow high school sophomores is the setting for this annual Leadership Seminar. For one boy and girl from each Hawaii high school, leadership qualities are emphasized through sessions related to business and economics, personal ethics and responsibility. For more than a decade, we have funded this program; long-term results show HOBY alumni put these early leadership skills to work in future careers.

\$5,000 Honolulu Academy of Arts—Museums provide valuable educational opportunities for students of all ages and attract visitors interested in learning more about Hawaii's multi-cultural arts community. Consistent Business Council funding for the Academy for more than two decades has helped support a high-quality, well-utilized resource.

\$2,500 San Francisco Opera—Here's a traditional art form A&B has supported for more than eighteen years—and the San Francisco Opera is world renowned.

\$25,000 Maui County Nutrition Program—"More than a meal" is the motto of this program which provides a noon meal for elderly and house-bound seniors, along with companionship and healthy, active lifestyle opportunities. Our support, which dates back to 1976, funds meals for needy retirees on Maui, home-delivered by loyal volunteers.

\$1,000 Edgewood Center for Children and Families—Recognized as San Francisco's top provider of mental health services, this agency serves more than 750 families and 3,500 children with a broad array of programs.

It has both residential and school programs and not only serve families but innovate to serve the needs of changing communities. One new program is for elderly caregivers. Our Foundation support dates back more than a decade.

\$2,000 Hawaiian Civic Club—An annual Holoaku Ball produced by this Civic Club celebrates Hawaiian song, dance, leis and attire, and raises scholarship funds that make higher education possible for hundreds of part-Hawaiian students. The A&B Foundation has funded this educational effort for six years.

\$2,500 Hawaii Family Support Center—One of our state's model social programs—Healthy Start—was pioneered by this agency. It identifies children born to high-risk families, then provides parenting and coping skills as counselors follow the children until age five. Since 1988, the A&B Foundation has provided operating support for this highly effective effort.

\$2,000 Hawaii History Day—Students create visual displays, write papers, produce videos or skits on an item of historical significance, "learning from the past" as their elders often advise. Thousands progress through competition at school level, to district then state level, with a dozen or so advancing

to national. Our support has helped fund the competition for six years.

\$405,000 United Way—The Foundation's most traditional support—truly the backbone of our grantmaking—is our annual series of grants to the United Way organizations in our key communities. In Hawaii, they are Aloha United Way, Maui United Way, Kauai United Way, Big Island United Way and the Friendly Isle (Molokai) United Way...totaling \$336,000.

On the Mainland, our support includes the Bay Area United Way, Napa-Solano United Way, United Way of Greater Los Angeles, United Way of King County, United Way of Columbia-Willamette and Valley of the Sun United Way. Our support dates back decades.

INNOVATION IS A TRADITION

AS THE WORLD CHANGES, new needs come to the A&B Foundation and our circle of support expands.

\$2,500 Hanapepe Economic Alliance—A group of community business people are working to revitalize a rural town in southwest Kauai; their focus is on attracting visitors to unique, historic sites in their community. Plans include small shops and art galleries to attract and hold the visitors' attention.

\$1,000 Good Beginnings Alliance—Having a statewide assessment of resources and identification of 'best practices' in infant and toddler care, and preschool education, is the first step to improving both the quality and quantity of these resources in Hawaii.

\$2,500 San Francisco Educational Services—An after-school tutoring and enrichment program is affordable for the families of students served by this multi-site effort. It combines volunteers and youngsters in a program that supports educational success for at-risk youth.

\$2,500 Philippine Centennial Celebration—Nearly twenty percent of Hawaii's population is Filipino, a result of agriculturally driven immigration. This Celebration recognized the Philippines' 100th anniversary of independence from Spain, in 1898, starting that country's journey to democracy.

\$2,000 Domestic Violence Clearinghouse—Continuing its prevention efforts, the Clearing-house developed "Dating 101: Teen Alert," a program to educate teens about unacceptable behavior during youthful dating relationships.

\$500 Hawaiian Quilt Research Project—Hawaiian quilting is a unique cultural hybrid; it combines traditional quilting skills of the missionary era with designs of Hawaiian culture. Our funds support efforts to locate, identify and document the hand-stitched cotton quilts, to help revive tradition and support the craft as a growing industry.

\$1,500 Kihei Youth Center—A healthy alternative for unsupervised adolescents, the Kihei Youth Center on Maui promotes social responsibility through its community service projects which teens plan and carry out, helping other non-profits in the process.

\$5,000 Maui Economic Development Board—This group is developing a program to help island residents better understand important community issues and the economic ramifications of the various alternatives they are considering.

\$2,500 Hawaii Natural History Association—This hui of educators and environmental stewards will create an environmental education curriculum for high school students, utilizing the natural outdoor laboratory provided by Haleakala, a dormant volcano on Maui.

\$500 Sisters Offering Support—A way out of the life of prostitution is the support offered by this Oahu organization, which is led by former victims of this way of life.

MAJOR GRANTS

EVERY YEAR, A PORTION of the A&B Foundation's funding is targeted to a few, large grants—typically made to major capital programs.

\$25,000 Kauai Habitat for Humanity—Traditionally, Habitat for Humanity taps volunteers to build or re-build homes for needy persons. On Kauai, Habitat for Humanity has progressed to a communal self-help building effort, and plans to develop a new community of nearly a hundred homes. Prospective home owners invest "sweat equity" as home-builders, working assembly-line fashion on their small neighborhood. Professional builders manage and direct the workers who have less cash assets but every ability to make their homes affordable via hands-on construction. Kauai Habitat held a ground blessing for Phase I in early 1999.

\$15,000 Big Brothers/Big Sisters of Maui—A successful partnership with related social services has enabled this national human services organization to obtain community support for a new service center on Maui. Located near a homeless shelter and transitional housing, this innovative facility serves a

combination of needs. In addition to its traditional service as match-maker between youngsters and an adult role model, BB/BS of Maui now matches teens with elementary-age students to provide after-school tutoring in a centrally-located facility. Daytime on weekdays, the facility serves a population of students enrolled in an alternative learning school, a final option for students unsuccessful at traditional school.

\$30,000 Hawaii Pacific University—Education is a priority for the A&B Foundation. We have a significant history of support for this fast-growing private university, now serving more than 7,000 students. Just one last enticement was needed to approve this significant grant—an opportunity for HPU to earn matching dollars through a Federally-funded National Endowment for the Humanities grant to build the school's library materials. It speaks to our priorities in many ways.

\$15,000 National Maritime Museum Association—

Added to our annual operating support for this venerable maritime institution, a significant grant was approved to continue the restoration of the historic sailing ship *Balclutha*, docked at San Francisco's Hyde Street Pier. Funding was designated for the replanking and renewal of the main deck of this 100+ year-old vessel. Our significant support recognizes the maritime heritage of our company and the focus of more than 1,000 of A&B's employees working for Matson Navigation Company.

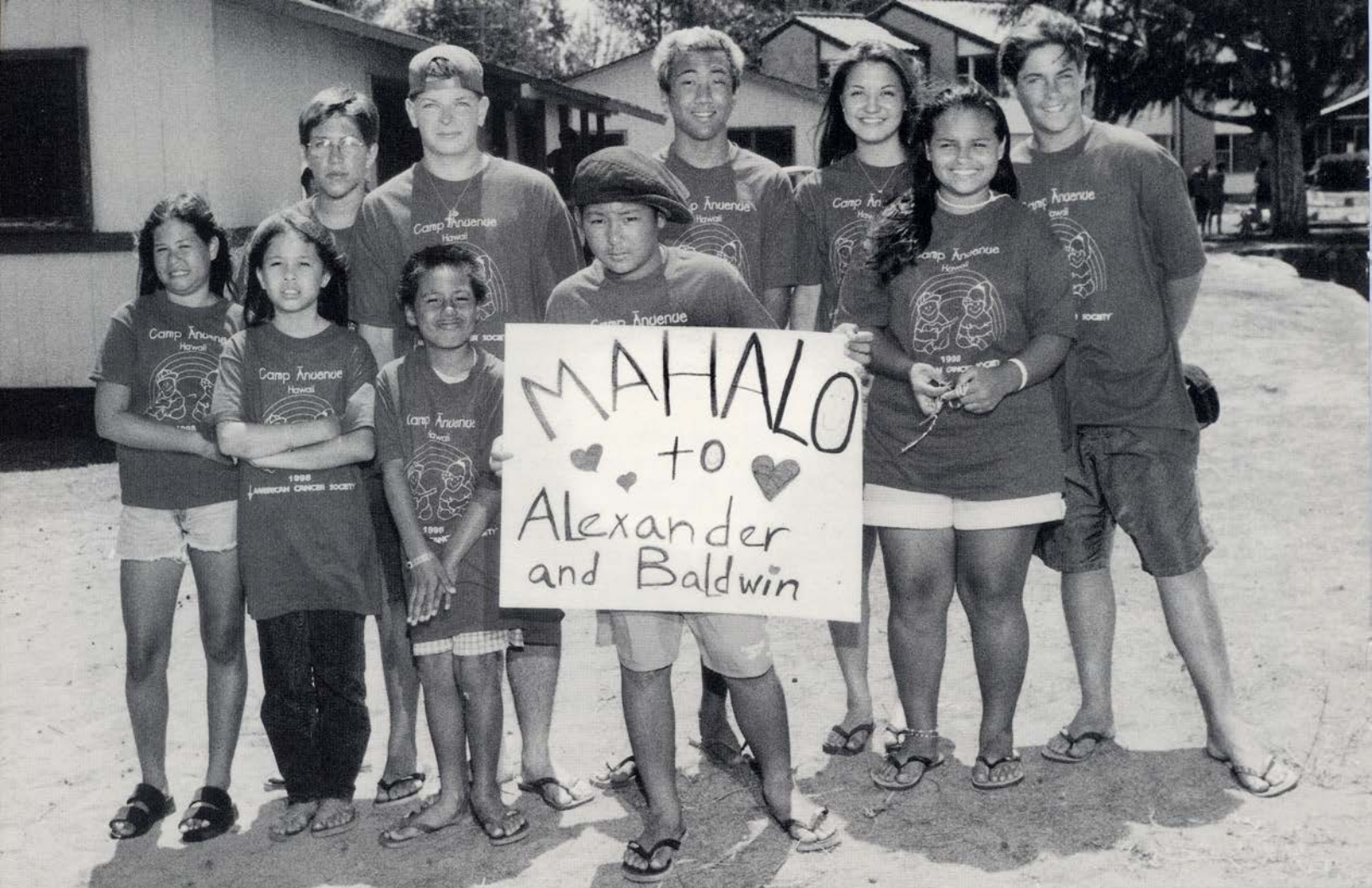
\$25,000 Maui Community College—Community Resource Development Center—In Hawaii, where 80-percent of the businesses are 'small', business smarts and community leadership skills are essential building blocks of a healthy community. Maui Community College provides education and training resources to develop future leaders of both commerce and community. This is the third year the A&B Foundation has provided support for the CRDC, and even short-term results show a benefit of improved skills for dozens of graduates working in for-profit and non-profit sectors of this island community.

\$10,000 Island School—Island School, begun on Kauai in 1977, is a successful, non-sectarian private school that, by 1998, served 162 students from pre-kindergarten through grade eight. Parents began—and the community supported—a gradual expansion to serve high school grades nine through twelve. The A&B Foundation provided capital support for additional classrooms and recreational facilities needed for these older students, following a tradition of support for Island School.

\$15,000 YWCA of Oahu—With a mission to empower women and girls and eliminate racism, the YWCA of Oahu was established in 1900 in downtown Honolulu. The YWCA provides athletic/exercise opportunities, employment-training, adult professional mentoring and child care programs. Its historic headquarters and service center, called Laniakea, needed significant restoration, including an upgrade of its hot-water heater from a 1920s-era boiler. This grant supported the YWCA's first capital campaign since its inception and followed on the Foundation's long history of annual support for this community organization.

MATCHING GIFTS

A&B'S EMPLOYEES, retirees and directors use their personal gifts to trigger dollar-for-dollar matching gifts from the A&B Foundation. In 1998, more than \$84,000 was donated to favorite charities, initially, by caring and involved individuals. Then, the Foundation matched these gifts.

The Foundation is proud to recognize the generosity of these donors and is pleased to report these 150 donors made 362 gifts to 180 organizations.

EDUCATION In 1998, \$62,613 was donated by faithful alumni, dedicated parents and concerned friends to the world of education—to 123 preschools, elementary and secondary schools, colleges and universities in Hawaii and on the Mainland. The geographic areas primarily benefiting were Oahu and Northern California. The largest category of beneficiaries was colleges and universities, which received \$38,495; gifts to secondary, elementary and preschools totaled 24,118—an increase of nearly one-third from the year prior!

CULTURE AND ARTS A total of \$21,699 was donated to cultural/artistic organizations by devoted supporters who made 146 gifts to 57 fortunate agencies. Geographically, Oahu and Northern California again topped the lists. Within this category, our donors' priorities (ranked by dollars) include libraries and museums; symphonies and musical groups; public radio and TV; theatrical and dance groups; and zoological and botanical organizations.

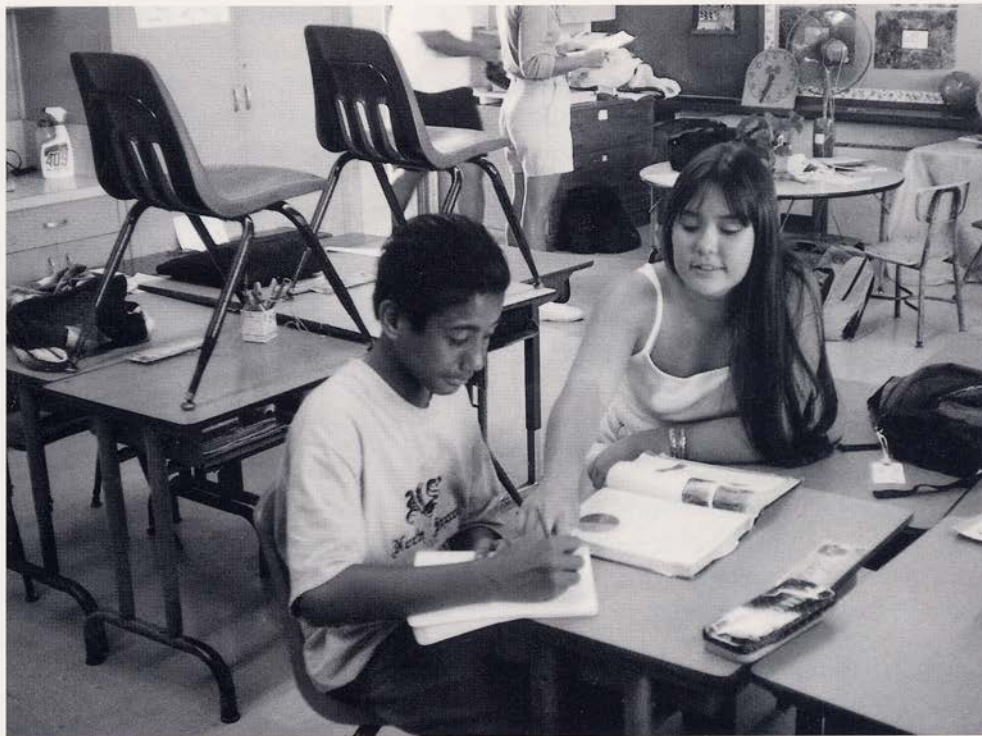
