# Rotating member



As we have done for decades, Alexander & Baldwin has sustained its charitable giving in 2008 to core communities in Hawaii, on the U.S. Mainland and in the Pacific Islands, with A&B Foundation grants that topped \$2.1 million.

These donations demonstrate our deep-seeded core values: that we have both a responsibility to sustain and an opportunity to help shape our communities. In Hawaii, we call it being a kama'aina company.

The majority of the Foundation's 2008 giving – \$1.7 million – was provided to non-profits serving a broad range of community needs in Hawaii and the Pacific Islands. An additional \$400,000 was donated to U.S. Mainland organizations.

Our support can be measured by dollars as well as by decades. But we know that commitment and change cannot be achieved by dollars alone. A&B employees definitely 'walk the talk' through active involvement in a variety of community causes; some are casual grassroots entities, others are well-established charities. All are worthy, and many have benefited from matching gift programs that doubled close to \$110,000 in personal donations made by our employees.

We recognize that our company, our nation and our world still face tough times ahead. While the future is not clear to any of us at this juncture, A&B remains committed to core values — to our own core value of being a good neighbor through thick and thin, and to the core values of our communities that help to define them and give them resilience during uncertain times.

We are grateful to A&B's board of directors and to A&B employees for their support and enabling us to report these gifts to the community with the confidence that our Foundation's values are clearly stated, and broadly demonstrated.

# Addressing Basic Human Needs

A significant portion of the Foundation's annual giving supports a broad range of health and human services providers, offering a helping hand or a needed leg up for those less fortunate.

## Shriners Hospital

**\$100,000**

Without worrying about payments for any services, patients from Hawaii and across the Pacific come to Shriners with orthopedic and spinal cord injuries, club feet, cleft lip and palate, and deformities associated with cerebral palsy or muscular dystrophy. A&B joined others in Hawaii to raise \$14 million to enable Shriners to treat more than 800 individuals each year.



## Feeding the Hungry



**\$31,750**

In addition to United Ways, grants were made to food programs in Northern Illinois, Washington and California's Alameda, Contra Costa and Solano counties. Community groups like Food Runners and SeaShare received funding, grants were also made to food bank programs in California and across Hawaii.

## Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center



**\$100,000**

As the largest provider of primary healthcare to Oahu's Leeward residents, this center also is a major employer and a training facility whose Waianae Health Academy has graduated more than 1,000 individuals. With Foundation support, a \$12 million effort has resulted in expanded facilities that house a women's health clinic, pediatric clinic and additional training rooms.

## Kaunoa Senior Services' Nutrition Program



**\$25,000**

For house-bound senior citizens, the delivery of a nutritious mid-day meal enables them to remain independent in their own homes. Kaunoa Senior Services also serves congregate meals at various locations throughout Maui County, providing a gathering place for active seniors to socialize and participate in activities that promote health, wellness and recreation.

## Habitat for Humanity



**\$10,000**

Mending a link in Maui's affordable housing supply chain, funding to help purchase a new truck helped put willing individuals to more efficient tasks at this volunteer-based community home-building charity. Previously, volunteers waited for tools, equipment and supplies to be delivered via unreliable transport.

# Building for the Future

To ensure our communities have the proper building blocks in place, the Foundation continued to invest in education and training for residents.

## Coast Guard Foundation

**\$14,200**

Core support for a vital link in our country's maritime safety. The men and women of the U.S. Coast Guard serve at key Hawaii and U.S. Mainland ports, usually far from their homes. This Foundation provides morale, welfare and scholarship support for these service personnel, and funding to families who lose a member in the line of duty.



## Hawaii Building Industry Foundation



**\$62,500**

A Construction Training Center will help develop Hawaii's skilled labor force, ensuring competency and safety across many building trades and skills. This grant, together with direct cash support from A&B-related businesses, totaled \$250,000.

## KCAA Preschools



**\$20,000**

Providing nearly a century of quality early childhood education on Oahu, and leading efforts to establish kindergartens in public schools, KCAA is pioneering another important effort through the establishment of the Center for Early Education and Development. This state-of-the-art center will help train early childhood educators for the future.

## Maui Culinary Academy



**\$1,500**

When the market value of this endowed scholarship – the Academy's first-ever – dropped below the payout threshold, A&B stepped up again to ensure this scholarship can be awarded for the third time in 2009. A hard-working second-year, Maui-educated chef-scholar will benefit, with funds for tuition and kitchen tools.

## Mills College



**\$50,000**

Launched this year with a gift of \$50,000, the Matson Navigation Company Endowed Scholarship will designate annual proceeds as merit-based support for girls originally from Hawaii or Guam to attend this West Coast college, which has received A&B funding over several decades.

## Pacific Islands

Funding for Red Cross societies across the Pacific Islands is almost an annual occurrence for the Foundation – almost as predictable as the typhoons and natural disasters which befall these low-lying nations. Support was directed in 2008 to entities serving Chuuk, Guam, Northern Marianas, Pohnpei and Palau.

## China

When the Wenchuan County, Sichuan earthquake took a heavy toll, the A&B Foundation stepped forward with a \$15,000 donation, via the American Red Cross. Funding company business activity in China has broadened our charitable horizons to international neighborhoods.

## Arizona and Illinois

Charities that serve senior citizens and the developmentally disabled are core grants in both of these mainland states. In Illinois, they include Little Friends, a center for children and adults with autism and other disabilities, and Lions Camp Tatiyee, a camping experience for this special population. Save the Family Foundation of Arizona is focused on families experiencing homelessness.

# Protecting our Environment

**Our support for the work of those dedicated to environmental protection and sustainability is steeped in Alexander & Baldwin's own long history of resource recycling, renewal and stewardship.**

## Marine Science Institute / \$10,000

For nearly forty years, the Institute has been inspiring new generations to respect and protect the ocean. This Bay-area environmental science program puts students in the marine habitat, and helps them understand both science and their personal role in protecting the environment. Students travel by small boat to undertake hands-on learning in bay and ocean environments.

## Kealia Pond National Wildlife Refuge / \$15,000

A significant gift, via the Tri-Isle RC&D, coupled with considerable volunteer assistance has installed nearly a mile of low fencing designed to reduce the likelihood that endangered green sea turtles will wander onto nearby roadways. Made of recycled materials, the fence also protects the sand dunes and the turtle eggs that, we hope, lie beneath.

# Recognizing Milestones

Just as neighbors celebrate shared accomplishments, the A&B Foundation supported special anniversary celebrations for a variety of worthy causes last year.

## 100 YEARS • Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children

With a legacy that has lasted a century, Kapiolani kicked off its Centennial year in 2009 with a tribute to its medical professionals and patients. A&B was a sponsor for this inaugural event, following grants in earlier decades to support their facilities, and enabling community participation free-of-charge.



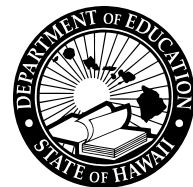
## 60 YEARS • American Cancer Society

Providing compassion and companionship for those facing cancer remains a core service of the American Cancer Society, as it recognized six decades of providing information, referral and group support. A&B support has focused on Camp Anuenue – a week-long opportunity for children facing cancer to be with kids just like themselves – and employee participation in the Relay for Life, to raise money to fight cancer.



## 50 YEARS • Maui Science & Engineering Fair

For a half-century, Maui's students have risen to the challenge and entered their projects in a competition to demonstrate their grasp of important math and science concepts. Annually, A&B helps to recognize the group of winners who advance to state and sometimes national competition.



## 40 YEARS • Manoa Valley Theatre

Funding for the 40th season of community theatre can be a dramatic turn of events – or we can sing or laugh about it, with the help of loyal audiences. What started as a small community theatre has been sustained by the community, which appreciates its cozy setting and the thrill of occasionally seeing a neighbor perform.



## 25 YEARS • 'Aha Punana Leo

Revitalizing Hawaiian as a daily, living language was the goal for this group a quarter-century ago. Today's Hawaiian immersion programs number a dozen or more and extend across the state, from preschools to university-level programs that have been evaluated as 'the most developed set of language revitalization programs in the U.S.'



## 25 YEARS • Aloha Medical Mission

Hawaii medical professionals donate time and services on Oahu and abroad via missions to Asian countries. Setting up traveling surgical suites and working round the clock to treat both chronic and acute conditions, these dedicated doctors provide life-improving and even life-saving care to individuals who otherwise could not afford such services.



# Keeping our Commitments

**This year, A&B completed multi-year pledge payments on a group of grants that reflect both diversity and depth in our community support.**

## **Bernice Pauahi Bishop Museum \$50,000**

**Restoration of Hawaiian Hall, including climate controls, lighting and accessibility changes, support the preservation and proper display of Hawaiian and Pacific cultural artifacts. The \$20 million improvements will enable more than 400,000 residents, visitors and Hawaii's schoolchildren to view nearly twice as many artifacts and new exhibits that tell the stories of ancient peoples in Hawaii and the Pacific. A&B completed its commitment this year.**

Hawaiian Hall's restored steel posts feature different designs on each floor. The original Koa wood throughout the Hall has also been refurbished.

## **Kawaiaha'o School & Church \$75,000**

An early education school offering both Hawaiian language and Montessori programs for all ethnicities is housed at the site of this landmark church, which is listed on the state and national registers of historic sites. A&B completed its pledge toward a \$14 million campaign for renovations and expansion of the community facilities - used by schools, civic clubs, secular and non-secular community and cultural groups, government agencies and individuals.

## **Arizona Memorial Museum Association \$100,000**

Renovations to one of Hawaii's most important historic sites - the Pearl Harbor Memorial and Visitor Center - also support the remembrance of one of our nation's most critical junctures and honor thousands of lives lost. Our pledge to this \$12.5 million effort was fulfilled this year.

## **YWCA of Oahu \$30,000**

Support for their \$12 million renovation of Lanikea, their downtown Honolulu facility, made possible child care, exercise and community meeting facilities, and a restaurant upgrade for earned income. A&B completed its grant in 2008.

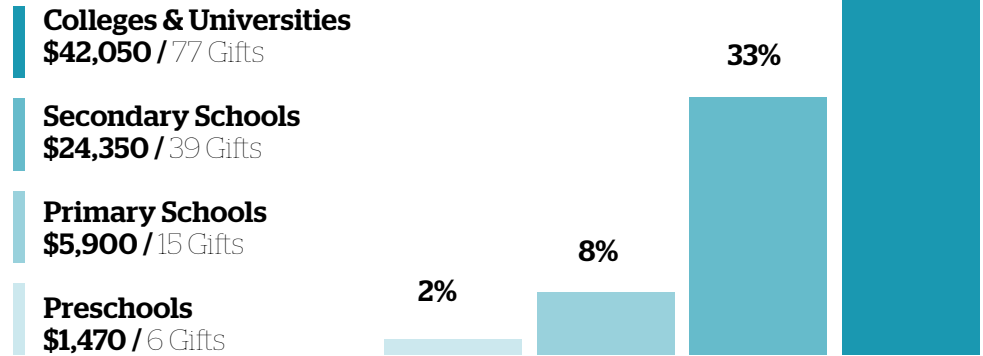

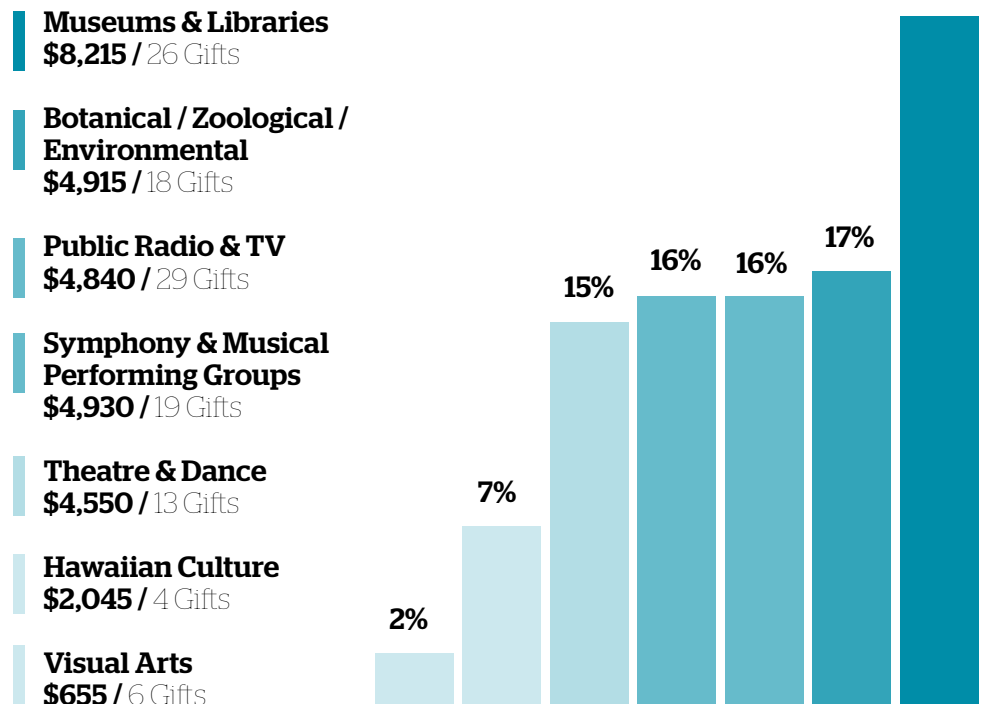

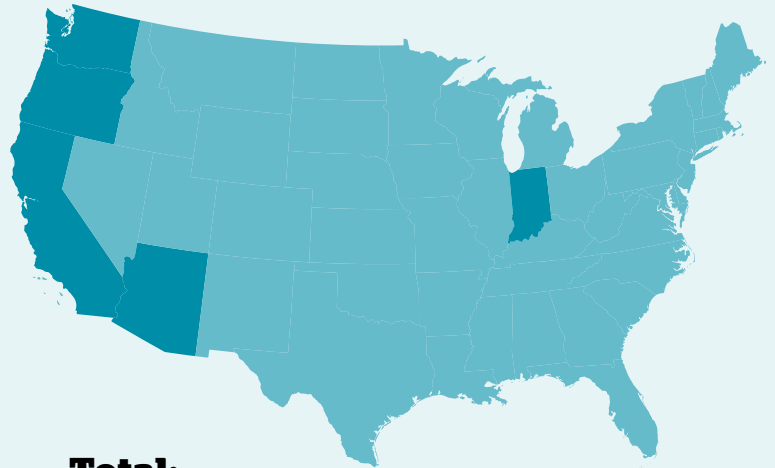
