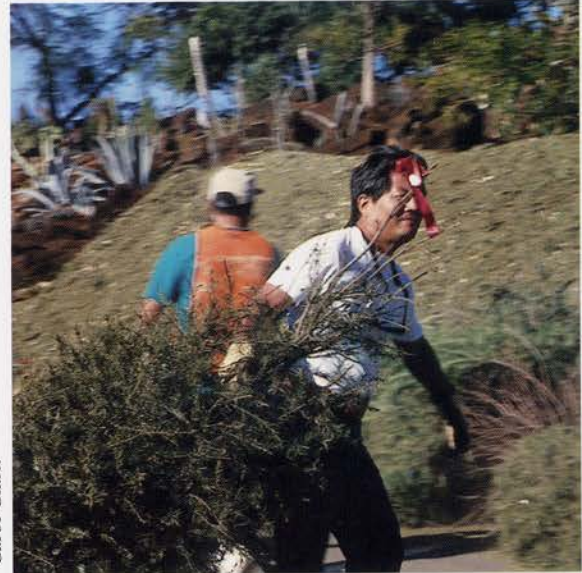

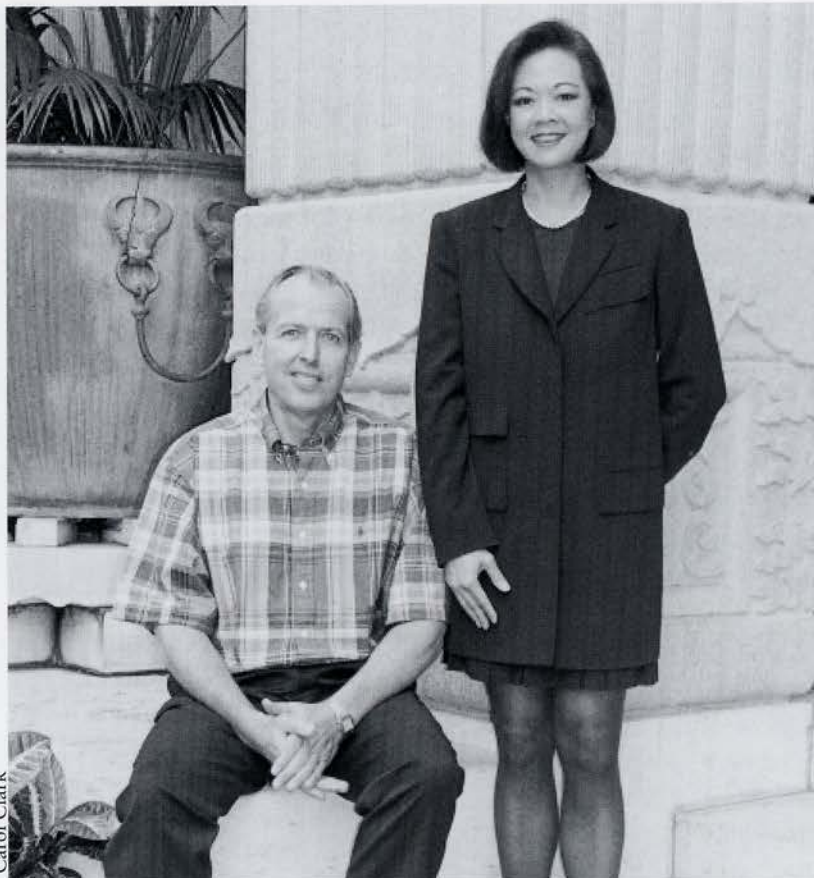

It's not old-fashioned, but it is a tradition at Alexander & Baldwin, Inc. to give back to the communities we serve -- and in which our employees and their families live and work.

Tradition is at the top of our minds in this, the 125th anniversary of the original sugar-growing partnership between Samuel T. Alexander and Henry P. Baldwin. The company they founded in 1870 is today a diversified corporation with an international reach, and the ethic they practiced right from the beginning -- giving back to their communities -- is as strong today as it was then.

"We're dedicating this report to our community partners as a way to celebrate the original A&B partnership," said John C. Couch, president and chief executive officer of Alexander & Baldwin, Inc. and president of the Alexander & Baldwin Foundation. "In 1994, these partners totaled more than three hundred charitable organizations and agencies that serve the communities in which our employees live and work, and we are proud to help them achieve their objectives."

Over the past year, approximately \$1.5 million in A&B profits were distributed through the A&B Foundation. Its Hawaii and Mainland Contributions Committees reviewed more than 500 requests in making the tough decisions on which partnerships to establish and continue.

Are these partnerships a business investment or a social responsibility?

"Both," said Meredith J. Ching, vice president of A&B and chair of the Hawaii Contributions Committee. "A&B, as one of the 'elder statesmen' of Hawaii businesses, is proud to help chart the course of corporate social responsibility in Hawaii. We also happen to believe that it is smart to invest in the communities that provide the people and the skills on which our businesses rely."

"We also want to give credit to our employees," added Couch. "Many have chosen to get personally involved in their communities by volunteering their time, energy and creativity. You'll be able to read about some of their efforts in this report."

Please take a few minutes, then, to review these present-day examples of Alexander & Baldwin's long tradition of giving, and to meet some of our many community partners.

### *Susannah Wesley Community Center*

Oahu's Susannah Wesley Community Center began in 1899 as the outreach work of a Methodist missionary who taught English and domestic skills to immigrants in the plantation community of Waipahu. It later evolved into the Susannah Wesley Home, a residence for more than 200 girls whose plantation-employee parents were unable to care for them during the day.

Today, the Center offers various social and community services, a format that was adopted over 30 years ago to meet the needs of the growing Kalihi-Palama community. It serves a diverse population of more than 90,000 people annually, many of them immigrants from the Phillippines, Samoa, Korea, Vietnam and Laos. In 1993, the Center's board recognized that the need existed for expanded facilities to serve more.

A&B employee Don Fujimoto spearheaded the effort to more than double their space, during which he found surprising numbers of people in the broader community whose lives, or the lives of their parents, were helped by the Center. For example, U.S. Senator Daniel Inouye's mother was a resident of the Home in the early 1900's.

The Alexander & Baldwin Foundation provided a lead gift of \$50,000 to the Center's \$2.6 million capital campaign.

### *Kauai Children's Fund- Kamalani Playground*

Kamalani Playground is now a reality for the people of Kauai. Kamalani, located near the town of Kapaa near the central population core of the east shore, began as a dream in early 1994 and took shape as over 1,000 Kauai children submitted designs and drawings of their "dream" playground.

Then, the adults of Kauai went to work. Robert Leathers, the country's foremost playground architect, was tapped to interpret the children's visions. An inspired group of influential Kauai citizens raised more than \$250,000.

Finally, over a 12-day period in October, 1994, more than two thousand members of this small island community volunteered their time to build the playground.

In addition to a \$5,000 grant from the A&B Foundation, A&B subsidiaries Matson Navigation Company, Inc. and Kauai Commercial Company shipped and hauled the materials for the playground from the mainland.

A&B employees Paul Douglass and Trinette Kauai were among others there to lend their hands during the construction phase of the project.

Kamalani Playground now stands as a visible testament to the power of a community that works hard and works together, to turn its dreams into reality.

### *Maui Arts and Cultural Center*

Kahului, Maui is the home of a new, state-of-the-art performing and visual arts center that is fast becoming a beacon for the Maui community.

MACC offers visual arts classrooms, an artisan's gallery, the McCoy Theatre, Castle Auditorium and, our pride and joy, the open-air, grassy 4000-person capacity Alexander & Baldwin Amphitheater.

From the beginning, A&B has provided support to the MACC citizen-lead campaign, chaired by Pundy Yokouchi along with the guidance of A&B Chairman R. J. Pfeiffer. A&B has responded with nearly \$800,000 to ensure that future generations of Maui residents could enjoy the arts and express their cultures.

After more than a decade in planning and construction, the Maui Arts & Cultural Center opened in May of 1994, with a three day community celebration.

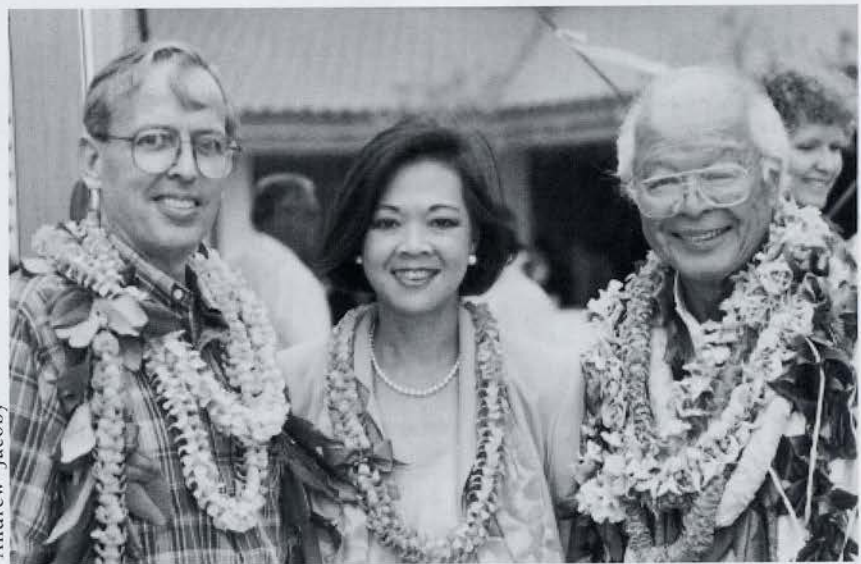
Since its opening, MACC has hosted more than 1,400 cultural and artistic events. More than 300,000 people, Maui and neighbor island residents and visitors, have enjoyed the setting and offerings of this grand facility.

*Children's Discovery Center*

The Hawaii Children's Museum opened its storefront facility at Dole Cannery Square in 1990. Since then, over 250,000 visitors have enjoyed the hands-on exhibits and educational programs presented by the Museum.

With the success of the temporary facility and the need to reach a broader audience, a permanent site in the Kakaako Waterfront Park was secured for the future home of the Children's Discovery Center. Through state-of-the-art, interactive exhibits and innovative programs, the Center will provide that "window to the world" that will allow children to experience, explore, investigate and discover things about themselves and the world that were never before imaginable. The Center is scheduled to open in 1996.

The Alexander & Baldwin Foundation has to date provided \$75,000 to the Center's capital campaign. Our continuing partnership with the Children's Discovery Center reaffirms A&B's commitment to quality education for children throughout Hawaii.

### John Swett High School

In the fall of 1988, John Swett High School in Crockett, California was "adopted" by C&H Sugar Company, also headquartered in this town of 3,200 people.

The school serves the entire population of Crockett and, in the past seven years, has been the recipient of more than \$50,000 in support from, initially, the C&H Sugar Trust, which was partially funded by the part-owner A&B.

When A&B became sole owner of C&H in 1993, support of John Swett High School continued through the A&B Foundation.

The funding has provided the school with much-needed supplies and equipment: computers, microscopes, tape recorders, software, books and other instructional equipment.

### Hawaii Nature Center - Maui & Oahu

Located in two beautiful oases tucked in the tropical valleys of Makiki on Oahu and Iao on Maui, the Hawaii Nature Center uses its natural surroundings to create places of discovery for Hawaii's children. More than 40,000 people visit these two sites yearly and, through HNC's environmental education programs, come away with a greater appreciation for the wonders of nature.

Our partnership with the Hawaii Nature Center dates back to 1988 when A&B began providing charitable support to upgrade the Oahu facility. Our support of the Center has continued as it has extended its reach to the children and families of Maui, an important community to A&B.

This partnership is a wonderful example of common goals between organizations and the beneficial results of for-profit and non-profit sectors working together.

This past October, A&B again partnered with Hawaii Nature Center to help produce *The Enchanted Forest*, a safe Halloween event, at both HNC sites. Hundreds of families came out for a harmonious evening of fun while building a greater understanding for the environment.

**A**t Alexander & Baldwin, philanthropy is a part of our corporate culture. In addition to the 14 members of the Hawaii and Mainland Contributions Committees, the Alexander & Baldwin Foundation enlists hundreds of other partners in charitable decision-making — our employees.

In 1994, eligible employees and retirees made more than 300 individual personal gifts totaling more than \$75,000 — which were matched dollar-for-dollar by the A&B Foundation.

This charitable giving partnership began in 1985. In the past ten years, employee initiatives have channeled more than \$1.35 million to educational and cultural organizations of their choice, putting their money, and the company's support, right where they want it.

### Education

This past year, more than half of our matching support for education, \$30,000, was directed to colleges and universities, as loyal alumni made generous donations to their alma maters. Primary and secondary education in Hawaii benefited from nearly \$14,000 in gifts, as parents supported their children's schools.

"I can contribute to my children's schools knowing that I work for a company that values my decision and will add their support, too" said Lyle Wilkinson, a manager at Hawaiian Commercial & Sugar Company on Maui.

The matching gift program was also extended to early childhood education, and several preschools received corporate matching funds for the first time in 1994.

In all, more than 70 educational institutions received matching grants totaling \$56,000.

### Culture & Arts

Symphonies, performing arts and museums; public radio and educational television; zoological and botanical societies — more than 65 organizations received \$14,000 in funds from generous employees and retirees in 1994.

Which organizations benefited most? The highest number of individual donations, fourteen, were made to KQED, the public television station in the Bay Area. The organization receiving the highest dollar support, \$1,560, was the San Francisco Ballet. Honolulu's Bishop Museum was a close second, receiving \$1,300.

The Nature Conservancy, the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, Honolulu Theatre for Youth and the Friends of the San Francisco Library were among other favorites of our partners in giving, our A&B employees.



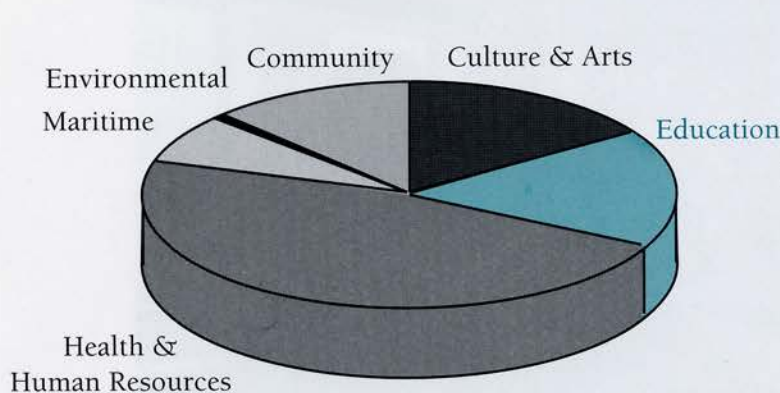

(above) A pre-schooler takes a break from St. Clement's Fun-a-Thon Fundraiser. Matching gifts pushed them over their goal this year.

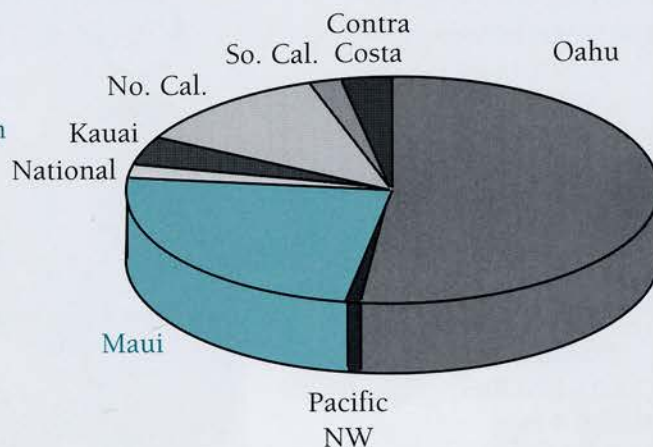

**D**uring 1994, the Alexander & Baldwin Foundation provided nearly \$1.5 million in charitable support to more than 330 organizations in Hawaii and on the U.S. mainland.

### By Category

The ever growing needs facing our **health & human** service partners were supported generously by the A&B Foundation, as this category of charities received nearly half, or 47 percent, of the Foundation's resources in 1994.

Gifts to United Ways, which provide operating funds to agencies serving A&B communities in Hawaii and on the mainland, totaled more than \$425,000. Other program areas supported include shelters for the homeless, immigrant transitional services, elders and family counseling.

**Education** was our next largest category of support: a substantial total of \$237,000, or 17 percent of total giving, up from 14 percent last year.

This total includes our employee-directed donations (matching gifts) which account for 21 percent of our educational support.

Some examples of program support: early education conference, economic/business education, science and history competitions and support for local colleges and universities. Computer equipment was a popular minor capital need, as students remain current in the ways of electronic information.

**Culture & arts** partners received 16 percent of the Foundation's funds. Examples include historical societies and museums; film festivals and Shakespeare festivals, drama, opera and theatre for youths.

The balance of the Foundation's support was directed to **maritime and environmental** causes and included maritime organizations both in Hawaii and on the mainland.

### By Location

Geographically, 81 percent of the Foundation's funds went to organizations within the State of Hawaii. The remaining 19 percent went to agencies on the U.S. mainland, primarily on the West Coast. The Contra Costa area, home to C&H Sugar, received more than 15 percent of mainland funds.

Of the \$1.15 million distributed in Hawaii, 52 percent went to Oahu organizations — many of which serve the entire state. Thirty eight percent of Hawaii's funds was directed to Maui.

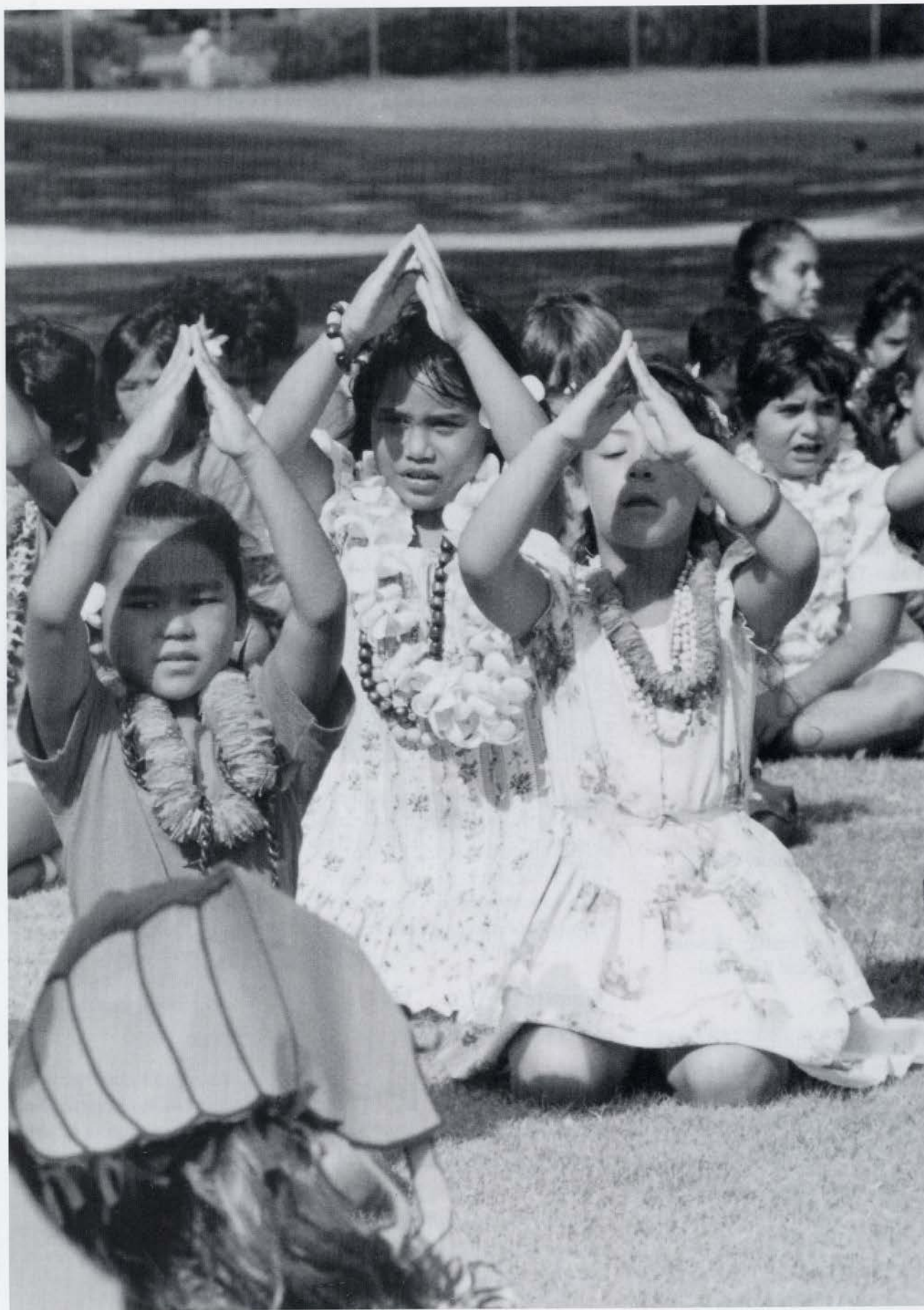
