

Responding to the needs of our communities

We have chosen two words to best characterize the Alexander & Baldwin Foundation's activity in 1996.

Responsible

he Alexander &Baldwin Foundation's sole mission is to perpetuate our funding corporation's tradition of donating generously to its communities: those in which A&B does business and in which A&B's employees live and work. This giving—this practice of doing good with the fruits of doing well—is a legacy of our corporation's founders, Samuel Thomas Alexander and Henry Perrine Baldwin. It is an extraordinary business practice that has endured many challenging economic times, changes in management and the criticism of business-for-profit purists.

We feel strongly that the tens of millions of dollars which have been donated over A&B's lifetime have been a superb investment. They have helped improve the quality of life for all, contributing to healthier, happier and more productive citizens.

Responsive

In 1996, the Foundation responded generously with a record number of grants to a record number of organizations, following a record number of requests. In total, nearly \$1.4 million was donated to our communities, to a broad constituency—geographically and programmatically—which echoes our funding corporation's reach and diversity. While the A&B Foundation cannot be the sole provider for all communities' needs, we strive to be responsive to priority needs, some special, but many which are broad-based and widely supported. All recipients of 1996 grants are listed in this *Review of Giving*; grants to organizations new to the A&B Foundation and a representative sample of our significant grants are featured.

This report would not be complete without acknowledgment of A&B's employees and retirees, who themselves responded generously to a record number of charitable causes. Their personal donations triggered \$84,000 in matching dollars from the A&B Foundation. We commend them for their generosity and express our appreciation to all of A&B's employees, whose hard work makes possible these Foundation grants, and those to be made in future years.

Grant Analysis

In 1996, the Alexander & Baldwin Foundation provided nearly \$1.4 million in charitable support in Hawaii and on the U.S. Mainland. Close to 500 grant requests were considered by the A&B Foundation's two committees; of these, roughly 300 received support. Significant this year was a forty percent increase—over 1995—in both the number of grants approved and the number of recipient organizations.


By Category


ealth & human services continue to receive the largest portion of the Foundation's resources—this year 41 percent. Three-quarters of that was granted as operating support for United Way organizations, which provide support to numerous agencies in Hawaii, along the West Coast and in Arizona.

Education was the second-largest category, reaping 19 percent of total giving—more than a quarter-million dollars. This category and the next largest—culture and arts (which received 16 percent of total giving)—benefit from the Foundation's matching gifts initiated by generous employees and retirees.

General community causes—such as scouting and other youth programs, humane societies, cultural festivals and fairs, and YMCA/YWCA programs—received a strong 15 percent of the Foundation's resources—just over \$200,000.

Two areas of special interest—maritime and environmental organizations—round out the Foundation's program of giving, and each received 4 percent of all dollars.





By Location

eographically, organizations within the State of Hawaii received 82 percent of the Foundation's funds. The remaining 18 percent went to needs on the U.S. Mainland. Nearly 70 percent of Mainland funds went to charities in the San Francisco Bay area, including those in the Contra Costa area.

Of the \$1.1 million distributed in Hawaii, 55 percent went to Oahu organizations—many of which serve the entire state. The island of Maui received a strong 31 percent of the total budget, or 37 percent of the Hawaii funding.

Responsive

New Grants

In 1996, the A&B Foundation responded to our communities with grants to more than 330 organizations—an increase of 91 organizations over 1995. The majority of grant recipients were well known to the A&B Foundation, but others were supported for the first time. These are few of our newly supported causes.

Health & Human Services

The A&B Foundation's largest category of support is for health & human services, and while our loyalties are to the United Ways in our communities, we recognize new organizations form to respond to new urgencies.

ormerly part of a state-wide organization, nowautonomous **Kauai Food Bank** expanded in 1996 to larger (but less costly) facilities; it received a \$2,500 grant for moving and renovation costs. **The Maalaea Community Garden** on Maui was supported with a \$2,000 grant to teach children to grow food and to value agriculture.

In Northern California, **Food For All** works to combat hunger and homelessness. A first-time grant of \$1,000 aided this agency, begun by volunteers from the retail food industry.

Other funding targets equally critical social needs. A state-wide project of Hawaii's **Domestic Violence Hotline and Legal Clearinghouse** focused on the urgent need for women and children in abusive situations to plan for their safety. A \$2,500 grant helped support this effort.

On Maui, **Parents and Children Together** received a \$1,500 grant to help establish a family visitation center—a safe, neutral environment in which child visitations and custody exchanges occur, assisting both children and parents.

A state-wide mental health service provider, **Mental Help Hawaii**, sought to update a dual-purpose video: to educate the public about mental illness and their services and to build a donor base. This effort was supported with \$1,500.

Culture and Arts

Scientists and educators have documented the value of arts—performing, visual and musical—as vehicles to decrease stress and hasten healing, improve learning, develop creative problem-solving skills, and generally improve one's quality of life.

holiday performance of Handel's *Messiah* by the Oahu Choral Society was underwritten with a \$1,000 grant; the sold-out classic concert was performed with musical accompaniment by the Honolulu Symphony. In Oakland, California, Producers Associates received a \$2,000 grant to help replace spotlights at the amphitheater where they produce a Summer Musical Series; they also received matching gift support, initiated by A&B employees.

New support for Hawaii's culture was demonstrated with grants large and small. The **Garden Island Arts Council** on Kauai held an ukulele jam during their Mokihana Festival, funded by a \$500 grant, and the **World Invitational Hula Festival** hosted dozens of international hula halau, aided by a grant of \$1,000. The Foundation responded to the **Daughters of Hawaii** for support of a bi-lingual book on the Hawaiian monarchy, *Memories of Majesty*, featuring the historic Queen Emma Summer Palace. A \$2,500 grant will help them preserve the Hawaiian language.

More significantly, a \$20,000 grant to the Smithsonian Institution will help make possible the **National Museum of the American Indian** in Washington D.C., which will include the history, culture and arts of the Native Hawaiians.

Education

Following health & human services, education ranks as the second largest recipient of A&B Foundation dollars, reflecting our value that education is the key to a better quality of life. Higher skill levels mean enhanced earning potential in our increasingly sophisticated world.

In the Bay area, San Francisco Educational Services provides after-school learning centers in thirteen needy neighborhoods, providing homework help, tutoring and access to computers; a first-time \$1,000 grant supported their services. In Hawaii, several schools new to the Foundation received grants this year for computers or playground equipment: Kula and Kamali'i Elementary schools on Maui (\$1,000 each) and the Haili Christian School on the Big Island (\$500). On Kauai, Koloa School (\$1,000) sought books and periodicals for their library and King Kaumuali'i School (\$500) bought ukuleles for their music program.

The **Hawaii High School Athletic Association**, which organizes tournaments and championships state-wide, was seeking sponsorships for these events and A&B responded with a \$1,000 grant for the state swimming tournament.

The **Hawaii Department of Education's** five-part series of live, interactive television programs focusing on water—**KidScience**—had both environmental and educational value; they received \$2,500.

In California, the Contra Costa County Office of Education and Contra Costa College gained first-time grants for operating needs.

In Hawaii, the **Orton Dyslexia Society** received funds to train teachers to recognize and work better with dyslexic students.

Community

Community causes are those which provide recreational or social opportunities for many members of the community, or otherwise promote general civic good.

P agdiriwang '96, a year-long celebration, marked several anniversaries of significance to the Filipino people in Hawaii: the centennial of the Philippine

Revolution; the 90th anniversary of the first immigration of Filipino laborers to Hawaii; and the 50th anniversary of both the last recruitment of Filipino labor and of the Philippines' independence from the United States. A \$5,000 grant funded monthly public forums on issues pertaining to Filipinos in Hawaii.

A \$500 grant to the **Maui Friends of the Library** helped stock a new library in Kihei with much-needed books and periodicals.

A \$1,000 grant helped start up a new athletic competition, the **Royal Hawaiian Rowing Challenge**, encouraging sports-oriented tourism for Hawaii as well as being a fun outlet for rowers—a sport not unrelated to traditional Hawaiian canoe paddling.

Major Grants

irroring our funding company's ties to the maritime community, the Foundation's ongoing support of the **Hawaii Maritime Center**—via \$45,000 in 1996—reflects our commitment to maritime education. Understanding Hawaii's seafaring past and ongoing relationship with the ocean is a goal for the Center, which hosts schoolchildren aboard the historic *Falls of Clyde* and the Polynesian Voyaging Society's canoe *Hokule'a*.

Environmental education can sound "dry", but when the **Hawaii Nature Center's** staff and volunteers guide schoolchildren through their day-long, in-the-field program, all get wet and muddy. The Center's new Maui facility—opening in 1997—will be a hands-on experience for children and adults, residents and visitors alike. It received a second \$25,000 grant from the Foundation.

The Maui Arts & Cultural Center is a fabulous facility which A&B's contributions helped to build. Now, beyond the bricks and mortar, we're helping to bring people—particularly children—to the Center, making art a part of their lives. Art education programs funded in 1996 with \$15,000 teach Maui's kids active participation and enjoyment of the arts.

Higher education in Hawaii benefited this year from a total of \$55,000 to the **University of Hawaii Foundation** for several needs: for Maui and Kauai Community Colleges and for the **John Bellinger Endowment** at Manoa's College of Arts and Sciences. This includes a doubling of our annual support to **Kauai Community College**—to \$10,000—and a new \$25,000 grant to **Maui Community College** to fund a Community Resource Development Center to develop leadership and entrepreneurial skills.

Continued Corporate Circle support at the \$10,000 level for **The Nature Conservancy of Hawaii** helps prevent loss of critical habitat and protect against the invasion of alien species which contribute to the extinction of Hawaii's native plants and animals.

When the **St. Francis Hospice** facility in Nuuanu, Oahu could expand no more, the A&B Foundation helped fund a larger, new facility in Ewa—close to new population centers. In addition to this \$10,000 capital grant, the Foundation continues program support to hospice programs on Oahu, Maui, and Kauai.

A \$5,000 grant is also funding a unique video, "Living Through Dying," that will become a valuable tool for families facing a loved one's demise, for medical professionals and for hospice and grief counselors.

Population growth in Windward Oahu stretched **Castle Medical Center's** emergency room severely; renovation and expansion, supported with a \$10,000 grant, ensures that critical cardiac, obstetric and trauma patients receive swift care when and where they need it.

Now under construction near the Kakaako Waterfront Park on Oahu, the **Children's Discovery Center** will open in 1998 and promises to be a hands-on learning experience for children of all ages. With a \$10,000 grant in 1996, a total of \$85,000 has been donated to this effort to date.

The **Pa'ia Youth & Cultural Center** on Maui applied a \$10,000 grant toward improvement of their facilities — much of it accomplished by volunteers. The Center serves teenagers from nearby intermediate and high schools with activities and programs after school, on weekends and during school vacations.

A \$25,000 grant to the **Maui Council of the Boy Scouts of America**—for expansion of the popular Camp Maluhia—was added to years of ongoing funding for this important program, which enjoys broad community support on Maui.

A \$10,000 grant to **Women Helping Women** helped fund expansion of their women's and children's shelter on Maui, responding to a critical social need.

A community effort with Federal, State and County funding and local citizen volunteers garnered a \$10,000 grant which the **Tri-Isle RC&D** will use to construct an elevated boardwalk at Maui's Kealia Pond. The Pond, part of which was donated by A&B to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, is a wetland and home to native Hawaiian birds, fish and turtles.

Matching Gifts

In 1996, A&B's employees, retirees and directors responded generously to the needs of their favorite charities and were rewarded for their philanthropy by the A&B Foundation's matching gifts program. First, these generous donors gave \$84,000 via 372 personal gifts to nearly 200 separate organizations. Then, the A&B Foundation responded to the donors' priorities, matching these gifts dollar-for-dollar.




Matching Gifts to Education

In 1996, \$64,304 was donated by faithful alumni, dedicated parents and concerned friends to more than 125 schools, colleges and universities in Hawaii and on the mainland. The geographic areas primarily benefiting were Northern California and Oahu. The primary beneficiaries were colleges and universities, which received \$43,404; gifts to secondary schools, elementary schools and preschools totaled \$20,900.

Matching Gifts to Culture and Arts

ifts to public radio and television, performing and visual arts, zoological and botanical organizations totaled \$19,746 this year—initiated by 156 personal donations, then matched by the A&B Foundation. Northern California and Oahu again reaped the majority of the donations—more than \$8,000 in each area—as our employees, retirees and directors supported a total of 69 different organizations.


